Choosing a private school for your child is a very personal process. Across the United States, there are many excellent schools to choose from – public, private, parochial, magnet and charter.

How do you begin to narrow down your choices? And how do you ultimately decide which school is best for your child, and your family?

This workbook can help as you start to think about variables that may factor into your decision-making. Determining your nonnegotiable criteria, and discovering where you have some flexibility, will help narrow your focus and avoid distractions.

We recommend printing the workbook, having each family member complete it, and then coming together to compare and discuss your findings. By empowering your child to be part of the decision-making process, it's likely they will experience less stress and be excited about their prospective school choices.




